## **Salesian Perspective**

This week, I visited with a parishioner who is suffering in body and memory. In the course of our conversation, he mentioned that his youngest child was recently married. When I asked him when that happened, he paused and replied, "I think it was about four years ago." Then he said, "It is sad when an event so unforgettable becomes forgettable." That has stayed with me all week. Memory is so powerful: either as a gift or at times a painful loss. In our tradition, we are called to imitate the memory of our God who has a long memory for our goodness but a very short one for our shortcomings and failings. It seems to me that too often we can remember our hurts, pains and the ways we have been offended instead of the many ways in which we are loved, accepted and uplifted each day. Most of us know of family members and friends who have experienced the pain of memory loss. I pray that we seek each day to think about those things and remember those words and moments that give us life and further love and strive to spend less time on those memories that only distract us and rob us of the joy and peace of mind to which we are called. In the Letter to the Philippians, we read these words: "Whatever is true, noble, right and pure, lovely, admirable, excellent and praiseworthy, think (and remember, my addition) of these things (Phil. 4:8).
